My name is Valerie Power, and I am the Unit Co-Ordinator for Action and Outreach for Mothers' Union in CFO. I support 'Thursdays in Black' to show compassion for the millions of vulnerable people who suffer all sorts of violence and abuse in our world – reminding ourselves to show respect for one another. Each person is a gift from God, one of his children – and each should have the right to live life to the full. The statistics are shocking, 1 in 3

women and girls globally will experience some form of gender-based violence at some point in their life time. This is so often invisible, except to the person who suffers — and to the person who carries



out the violence – as victims of violence are often silent, due to fear of further violence.

My name is Joan Blake, and I am the unit Co-Ordinator for Finance and Central Services for Mothers' Union in CFO. I support 'Thursdays in Black' to identify with the campaign to help

eradicate violence against women, children and men. I in 3 women worldwide have experienced domestic or sexual abuse. This is



unacceptable. Actions speak louder than words, and whilst each action we take may appear a drop in the ocean, the ocean gradually fills. As Christians there is no room for apathy. No one should have to fear a bully.

My name is Linda Ward, and I am the Social Policy Representative for Mothers' Union in CFO. I support Thursdays in Black, which was an initiative of the World Council of Churches, is

designed to draw attention to the campaign to end gender-based violence and support those affected by it. GBV is rooted in gender inequality and creates
